How do people repay their debt?

In this NBER working paper, authors John Gathergood, Neale Mahoney, Neil Stewart & Joerg Weber use information on credit card contract terms, monthly statements, and repayments for 1.4 million individuals in the United Kingdom over a two-year period, to study how individuals choose to allocate repayments across their credit cards.

Their findings show that individuals do not allocate repayments to the cards with the higher interest rates, which would minimize the cost of borrowing, but allocate their repayments using a balance-matching heuristic. This is where individuals match the share of repayments on each card to the share of balances on each card.

The results are important from a practical perspective because consumers following a balance-matching heuristic are likely to face a higher than necessary cost of borrowing.

Showcasing two new books by NIBS authors.

The Mind is Flat: The Illusion of Mental Depth and the Improvised Mind by Nick Chater, was published by Allen Lane in March.

It's fair to say most of us assume our beliefs, fears and desires arise from within our minds, which some may call our subconscious. This leads to a desire to access this mysterious place in the hope of better understanding ourselves. In his book Nick debunks the myth that we have a hidden inner life. Drawing on multi-discipline research in neuroscience, behavioural psychology and perception, he argues that unconscious thought is a myth; there is no subconscious and we generate our ideas, motives and thoughts in the moment.

Even to readers who neither embrace Sugden's arguments nor accept his conclusions - a group among which I classify myself - this book is critical reading for those wishing to gain an understanding of the vigorous and vibrant debate taking place over the ethical and policy implication of behavioural economics."
